

























Previous Success

- ▼ IEPA approved watershed plans for Evergreen Lake and Lake Bloomington in 2008
 - Plans created by MCSWCD in partnership with local gov't, landowners, local experts, and citizens
 - Plans include practices that decrease the amount of nutrients and sediment entering water supply reservoirs
 - Most of the emphasis in implementation and outreach was focused on the agricultural community.
- Increasing public education addressing urban issues that affect the watershed
 - "Your Water, Your Future" \$90,000 IEPA 319 grant MCSWCD, Illinois State University, City of Bloomington.
 - Survey 58% participation rate (550 individual households completed the survey) which contributed to the great results of the survey.

- Grant funding for Reducing Nitrogen Loss and Improving Water Quality
 - \$96,759 IEPA 319 grant
 - Ongoing effort with MCSWCD
 - 3000 acres converted from fall anhydrous ammonia to spring side dress nitrogen application process.
- The Lake Bloomington watershed has been selected for a National Water Quality Initiative Pilot program from the United States Department of Agricultural-Natural Resources Conservation Service.
 - Partnership between City, MCSWCD, and landowners to assist landowners with developing customized watershed assessment and outreach plans
 - One of five (5) watersheds selected for the program in the United States.











Section 319(h) Grant Program

- Section 319(h) Grant Program is a competitive financial assistance grant program established to help control nonpoint source (NPS) pollution
- MCSWCD applied in 2018
- Council committed funds for the cost/share grant in the amount of \$71,250 in July 2018
- A year passed before IEPA sent award notifications
- MCSWCD notified that the grant application was APPROVED in August 2019
- ▼ Total project cost is \$149,625, which includes \$58,375 from the grant and matching funds of \$71,250 from City of Bloomington and \$20,000 from Illinois Farm Bureau
- Public Works requests approval for the purchase of watershed consulting services from MCSWCD via an IGA

What's next?

- If approved, City will purchase watershed planning services from MCSWCD to update existing watershed plans
 - Current watershed plans are 10 years old
 - MCSWCD will partner with consultants with experience in this area
 - MCSWCD will compile and analyze updates since original plans
 - Updates will also include Environmental Protection Agency's 9 Elements or Watershed Planning

- Illinois State University will perform field studies within the watersheds of both reservoirs
- The City will continue to seek input from additional partners to develop the plan.
- The watershed plan should take 18-24 months to complete.
