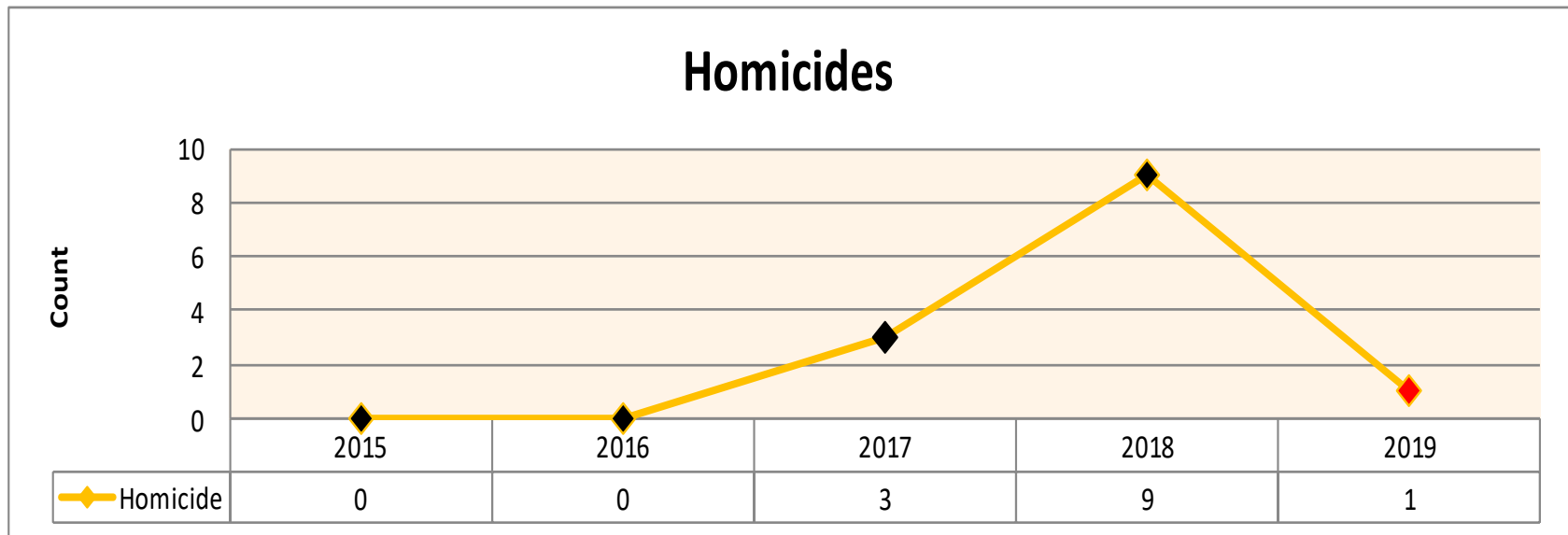

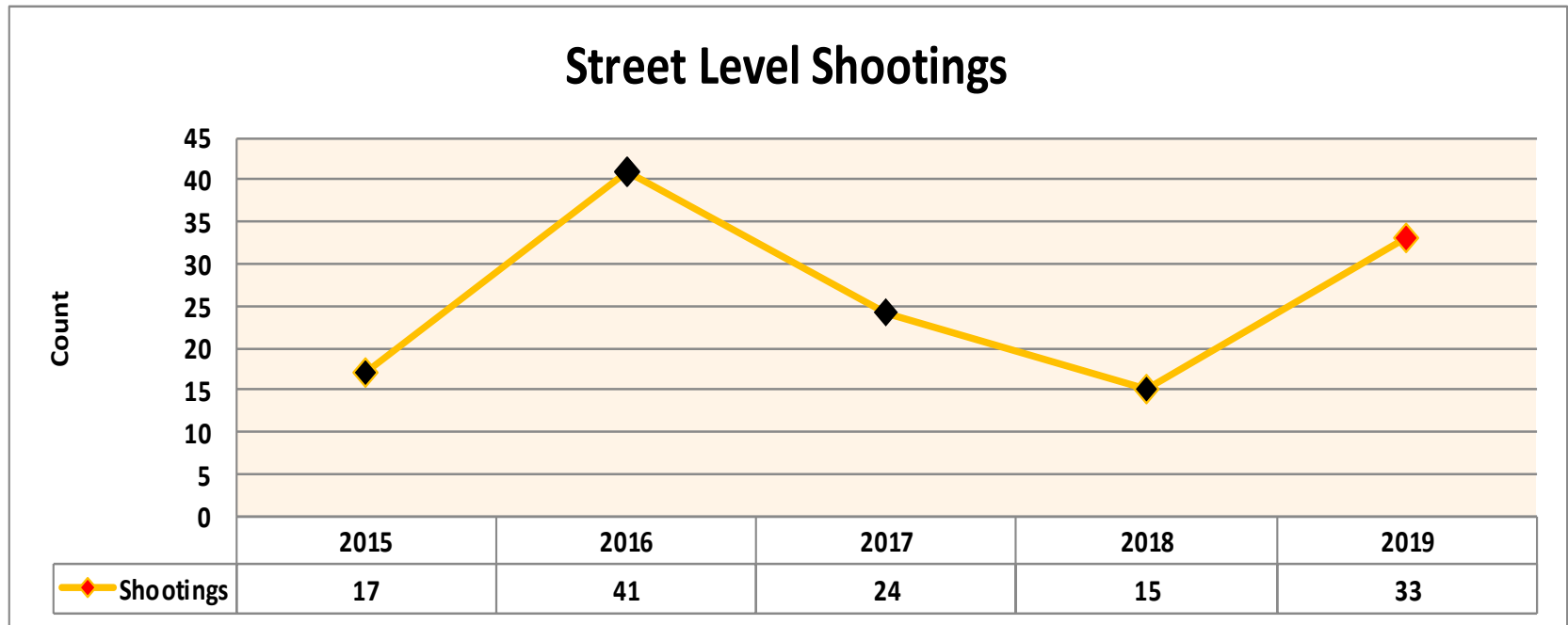
Homicides in 2019

- We recorded 1 homicide in 2019
 - April shooting in the 1200 block of Orchard with one death and two additional non-fatal victims.
 - Three suspects were arrested in this case.
- Multiple upcoming trials for 2018 homicides.



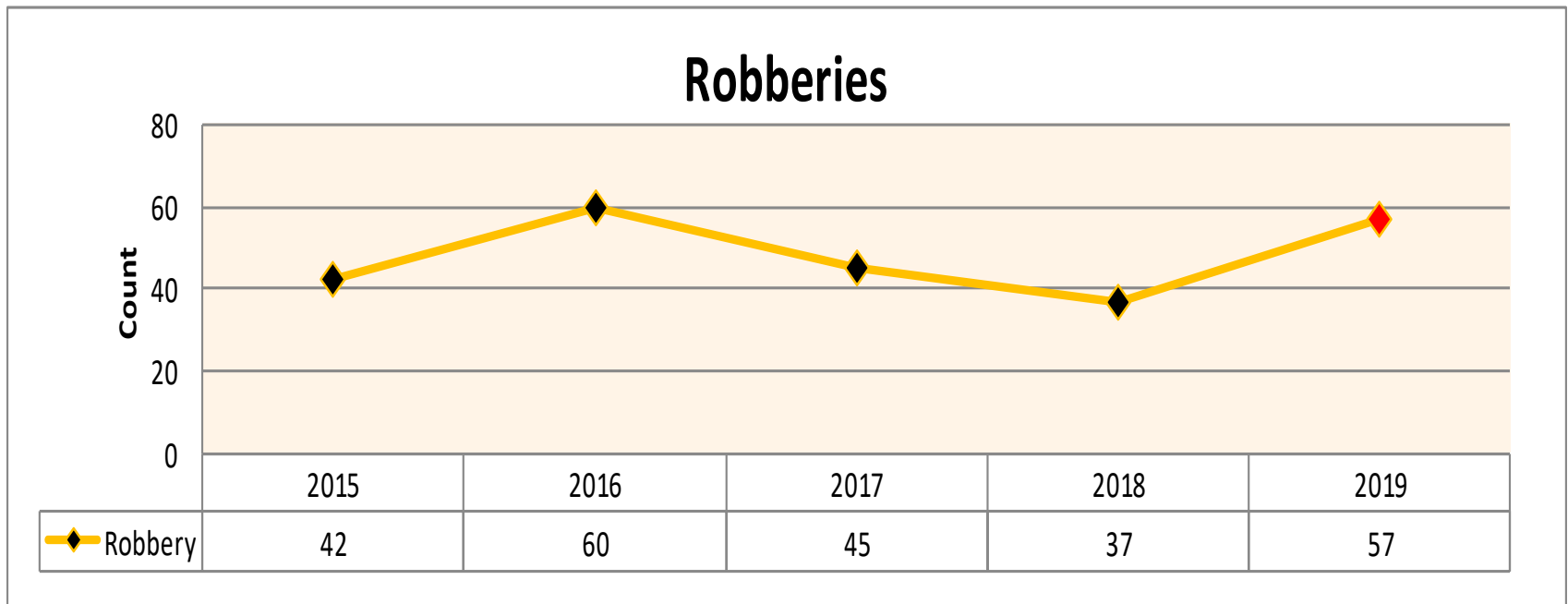
Shootings

- We recorded 33 shootings in 2019, with 12 subjects hit by gunfire, resulting in 1 death.
- The increase (24%) in Aggravated Batteries this year is correlated with our shootings.
- Gun possession by young males has become a cultural issue.



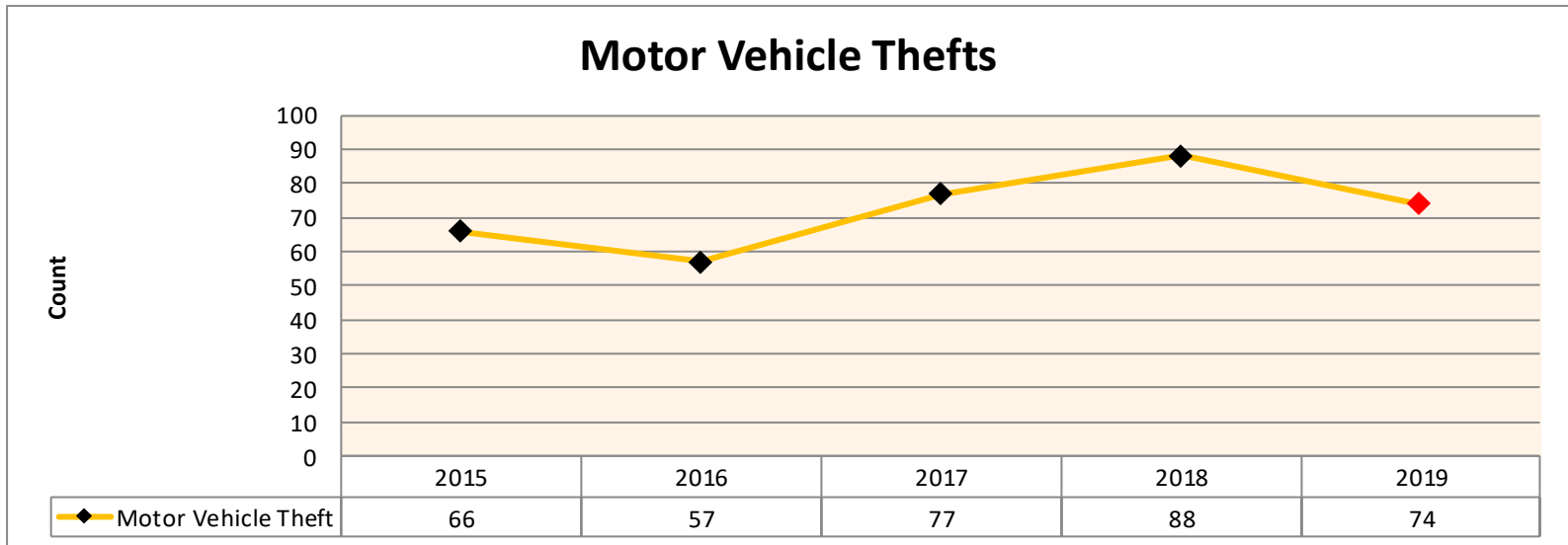
Robbery in 2019

- We recorded 57 robberies in 2019, which is 9 above our five year average.
- 30 of these incidents were street-level robberies.
- Again, gun possession plays a role in this increase.



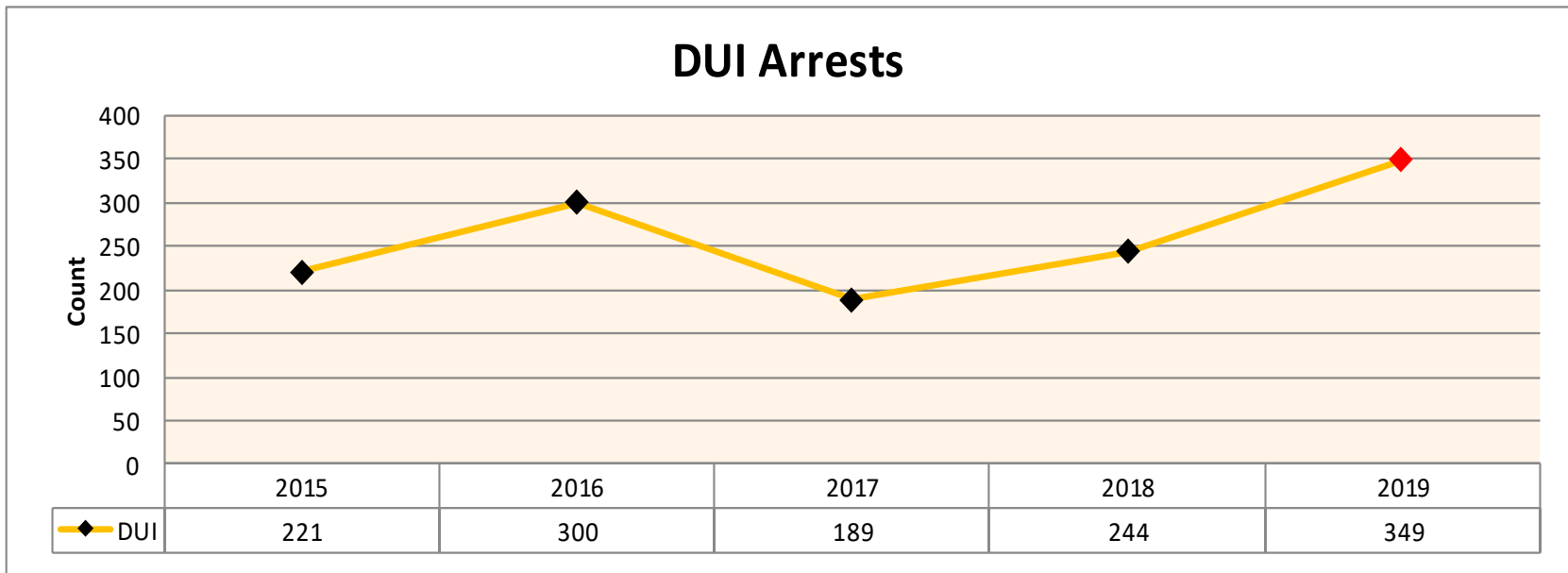
Motor Vehicle Theft in 2019

- We saw a slight decrease in 2019.
- Virtually all vehicles stolen during car burglaries where keys are left in the vehicle.
- Stolen vehicles are normally used for transportation for several days before being abandoned.



DUI Arrests in 2019

- We arrested 105 more intoxicated drivers than in 2018.
- One officer accounted for 118 of our DUI arrests last year.
- DUI enforcement remains a high priority at BPD.



Violent Crime Prevention Efforts

- **Launch:** In March 2019, BPD created framework for a conflict resolution program that supports local at-risk youth, 11 to 16 years of age.
 - Funding awarded to City Life program for service delivery
 - Programs include mentoring, leadership skills, employment and conflict resolution (from abuse, loss, violence).
 - Clients also engage with School Resource Officers acting in conjunction with school staff and City Life staff.
- **Cost** is \$17,500 for conflict resolution program and \$2,500 for summer camp
- **Results:** 13 students gained employment, 2 students took leadership roles at jobs, 1 student enrolled in college and 6 students graduated high school.

2020 Departmental Goals

- Increase staffing according to the COB 20 year master plan (published 2015).
- Increase departmental efficiencies, both internally and externally.
- Work with local mental health programs to find alternatives to hospitalization and/or arrest.
- Continue our focus on reducing violent street level gun and gang crimes.
