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### **Preface**

The City of Bloomington Strategic Plan was adopted on January 25, 2010 by the City Council. This was the first Strategic Plan adopted by the City of Bloomington in recent years and in it contained the first annual Action Agenda. The Action Agenda runs on a calendar year.

The Council met on October 8 & 9, 2010 to review the 2010 Action Agenda and draft the new 2011 Action Agenda. The Council also changed the order of the 6 Major Goals for the City of Bloomington.

Since then, the City Manager and Executive Staff have reviewed the draft list for the 2011 Action Agenda from the Council and have applied a "reality check" on the items. Meaning, staff has evaluated each agenda item and determined if it could be completed in 2011 given current resources and current staffing levels. In many cases funding to accomplish the Action Agenda item is included in the Proposed FY 2012 Budget.

The 2011 Action Agenda was adopted by the City Council at the April 11, 2011 Council Meeting.
