## **Outdoor Fires Reminder**



Spring is finally here, and outdoor activities will soon begin again—picking up dead branches, cleaning out the gutters, raking leftover leaves...and getting rid of

yard waste materials. The Bloomington Fire Department would like to remind everyone that within the city limits of Bloomington, no person shall burn any garbage, solid waste, commercial solid waste, yard waste, household waste, junk, refuse, rubbish, construction waste, hazardous waste, buildings or structures.

The use of outdoor grills and barbecues for cooking is permitted. Recreational fires shall be allowed in approved containers or fire pits. Recreational fires shall be defined as an outdoor fire whose purpose is for pleasure, religious, ceremonial, cooking, warmth or similar purposes.

Caution still needs to be used, even when using approved grills, containers and fire pits. Fires must be at least 8 feet away from structures or roadways; only clean, dry firewood or charcoal may be used; a fire extinguisher or garden hose needs to be readily available; fires need to be extinguished after a maximum of 4 hours of use, or if wind conditions are15 mph or greater.

# Economic Development-

The City of Bloomington has announced that total retail sales tax receipts increased to 15.91 percent in 2012 versus the same 2011 time frame.

"Strong performance from our local and national retailers led to year-overyear improvement in sales growth," said City Manager David Hales. "The positive trends we've experienced throughout the year show continued consumer demand and confidence in the local economy. We are taking advantage of the improved trends through an active pipeline of new retail opportunities which most recently yielded the procurement of 'Binny's Beverage Depot' in Lakewood Plaza in October 2012 and the scheduled opening of an 'Ashley Furniture Homestore' in Colonial Plaza in the coming months of 2013. The redevelopment of these key retail centers, along with the continued success of existing properties will provide a solid foundation for growth moving forward."

National trends in the retail market also demonstrate Bloomington's

continued economic recovery. The International Council of Shopping Centers reported an increase of 4.2 percent in total national average Retail Sales U.S. comparable chain store sales for 2012, 11.71 percent less than the increase seen in Bloomington.

City residents stand to benefit from the positive sales performance with a correlating trend in sales tax revenue. The 2012 calendar year local sales tax collections represented \$29,547,929 in revenue for the City of Bloomington; this is compared to \$26,676,212 during the same time period in 2011. "As local retail sales and related sales tax revenue increase, the burden on individual tax payers is lessened," stated Bloomington Finance Director Patti Lynn Silva. According to the year-end report by the Illinois Department of Revenue, performance by sector was as follows:

General Merchandise: +10.28% Food: +0.60% Drinking and Eating Places: +7.77% Apparel: -15.15% Furniture and Household: +66.80% Lumber, Hardware, Building: +16.67% Automotive and Gas Stations: +30.93% Drugs and Miscellaneous Retail:+7.69%

Agriculture and All Others: +2.34% Manufactures: +2.85%

Comparing the year's retail growth to those of surrounding Illinois communities, Bloomington's performance ranks highest. Performance by city was as follows:

Bloomington: +15.91% Peoria: +5.34% Normal: +5.18% Urbana: +4.86% Champaign: +3.09% Springfield: +2.64% Rockford: +2.27% Decatur: -0.23%

**Contractor Waste-** The City will not collect bulk or building waste created by any contractor.

Streets and Alleys- Streets, alleys and sidewalks in the City shall be kept free and clear of all hindrances and encroachments for the use of the public. **Vehicles-** All unlicensed or unregistered and/or uninspected motor vehicles or trailers must be parked in a garage or other structure meeting code requirements and all such vehicles and trailers must be in safe operating condition. **Buildings-** Each building must have a building number observable from the public right of way.

Weeds and Grass- Lawns should not exceed 8 inches in height.
