


Issues regarding private sewer services



THE BASIC ISSUE:


Sewer pipes that serve homes, businesses and industry eventually connect with the public sewer. Where do private responsibilities end and public responsibilities begin?

ONE SCHOOL OF THOUGHT



Public responsibility begins at the City right-of-way

COMPETING SCHOOL OF THOUGHT



Private responsibility continues all the way to (and including) the construction to the sewer main

RAMIFICATIONS: COSTLY REPAIRS OFTEN TRACE TO BROKEN AND FAULTY CONNECTIONS



CURRENT PRACTICE

CITY PAYS ABOUT \$200,000 A YEAR FOR PROBLEMS
TRACED TO PRIVATE SEWER SERVICES



CURRENTLY: CITY FIXES AND PAYS FOR SEWER FAILURES WHEN THEY IMPACT THE PUBLIC STREET, ALLEY OR SIDEWALK.



AMONG ISSUES OUTLINED IN REPORT



Should the property owner pay if his/her sewer service caused the problem?

Is it fair for the community to pay for a problem caused by a private sewer service? Is it fair for the City to impose a financial hardship on the property owner?

Does the City "own" the sewer service in the right-of-way?

If the owner pays, does he pick the contractor and, if so, can we be sure of quality and safety?

The City Code needs to be clarified.
