The City conducted a variety of activities in Program Year 41 (PY41) designed to meet the needs our low and moderate income residents. Activities were focused on the following areas: rehabilitation of single-family, owner-occupied housing (20), demolition of blighted and deteriorated structures (4), public service projects (5), infrastructure improvements (2) and West Bloomington Revitalization Project programs (2). All activities were conducted in the City's designed slum/blight and other low/moderate income areas. Significate progress was made in meeting the goals of the 5-year Strategic Plan as well as the PY41 Action Plan.

Note: The actual numbers for the tables below have been updated from the original reports produced in order to more accurately depict the work completed. The Grants Coordinator was newly hired when the original Stratetic and Action Plans were created so several of the numbers are out of balance by quite a bit. An explanation for each area can be found in the final narrative for this section. A substantial amendment of the Strategic Plan may ultimately be necessary.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

Housing Rehabilitation

The City provided CDBG funding for twenty-one housing rehabilitation projects in the amount of \$237,402.28. Thirteen of the activities received assistance in the form of a 0% interest deferred loan. Two of the activities were grants for materials to build accessibilty ramps through the City's partnership with AMBUCS. Two homeowners received assistance in the form of a grant as the work completed was necessary in order for the City to complete other neighboring projects. One of the projects was a grant to Construction Charities for work on a manufactured home. One activity was a grant to MarcFirst to provide gap funding for an accessibility ramp at a multi-family residents. The ramp was necessary in order to keep an adolescent with cerebral palsy in the family home. The City had originally dedicated \$100,000 in CDBG funding to provide new sewer connections to low and moderate income households along E. Jackson St. These connections would compliment the extensive sewer and water replacement being conducted in the area. However, despite multiple outreach efforts including direct mailings and door-to-door solicitations only one homeowner applied for the opportunity to connect to the new sewer with a 5-year forgiveable loan term. The funds were redirected to other activities per a substantial amendment. This activity was originally included in the Strategic Plan as a Public Facility/Infrastructure project to benefit low and moderate households.

In addition to the City's dedicated CDBG funds, it partnered with the West Bloomington Revitalization Project and Mid Central Community Action (MCCA) to support the West Bloomington Roofing Project. MCCA received \$100,000 Neighborworks grant to provide up to seven roof replacements in West Bloomington between October 1, 2015 and September 30, 2016. MCCA utilized the City's waiting list for this project. One roof was replaced during PY41. The remaining roof projects will be completed during the PY42 build season.

Demolition

The City expended \$118,629.54 in CDBG funding to perform a portion of the demolition and clearance on four properties during PY42. Additional Illinois Housing Development Authority's Abandoned Property Program funds in the amount of \$6,603.07 were utilized to support the previously mentioned four properties plus one additional. All four of the properties have been donated to either YouthBuild or Habitat for Humanity. Since the end use of the projects is ultimately related to the

Low/Mod Housing national objective, the activities will remain open in IDIS until the house is completely finished and occupied so demographic data can be collected.

Public Services

Public Services play a very important role in the City's plan to meet the needs of those most in need. The City's support was vital to the continuation of many of these programs this year due to the budget impasse and no funds flowing from the state. Five activities were funded for PY41: PATH - 3 individual activities (\$43,680); Bloomington Housing Authority (\$10,000); and Peace Meals Senior Nutrition Program (\$20,000).

- PATH received \$14,000 to support a portion of the FT Homeless Outreach Worker position. This
 position served 430 clients with 310 being extremely low income and the remainder meeting
 the low income guidelines. This position provides homeless assessments, linkage to services,
 and transportation as needed. CDBG funds are utilized to meet the required match for HUD's
 Supportive Housing Program grant.
- PATH received \$9,680 to support a portion of the FT Housing and Benefits Specialist position.
 This position served 207 clients with 127 meeting the extremely low income guidelines and the
 remainder qualified as low income. The Housing and Benefits Specialist works closely with
 providers to ensure that all homeless persons are placed in permanent housing within 12
 months of first contact and serves as the local expert on community resources for housing of
 homeless.
- PATH received \$20,000 to administer the Emergency Grant Program. This program provides assistance to families and inviduals in imminent danger of becoming homeless or currently experiencing homelessness. Payments are made on behalf of the client for rental assistance, emergency shelter, utility payments, etc. Payments cannot exceed 3 months and are made directly to the provider. A portion of the grant is used to support the Self-Neglect Program. CDBG funds support a PT coordinator position as well as moving expenses and dumpster rental for persons facing eviction or home condemnation due to hoarding conditions. Seventeen individuals were assisted through these programs.
- Bloomington Housing Authority received \$10,000 to provide Job Development Training to Section 8 and public housing residents. The structure for this year's program was slightly different and less costly. The savings in training fees was utilized to provide two week-long sessions and a job fair reaching 75 residents in total. This was the original goal for the entire 5-Year Plan. The original goal was based on an average of 15 participants per year. The City will strongly suggest this format continue. Four job placements came from the activities. This activity will be moved to the administration line item for PY42 since Section 3 is a requirement of receiving CDBG funding.
- Peace Meals provided in-home and congregate meal delivery to 354 senior citizens in Bloomington. 23,383 meals were served to Bloomington residents with CDBG funds providing 3000 meals for the PY.

WBRP

The City supported two West Bloomington Revitalization Projects in PY41. The Facade Program provided minor to moderate home repairs to the exterior of eight homes in the West Bloomington Revitalization Project area. WBRP utilized \$10,000 in CDBG funding in combination with funds from the PNC Foundation and other sources to complete the projects. The City provided an additional \$5,000 to support the WBRP Tool Library. WBRP also supports this program through a variety of funding sources in addition to CDBG. The Tool Library provided five workshops for homeowners and low and moderate income children reaching 82 individuals. Additionally, the Tool Library had more than 1700 tool loans for the year, putting it at more than 5000 loans since 2013.

Infrastructure

Infrastructure played a significant role in the City's planning for PY41. \$228,071.36 in CDBG funds were expended to support a sewer replacement and street resurfacing project on N. Catherine St. N. Catherine is located in the City's designed slum/blight area. CDBG funds were utilized to provide sewer connection for seven homes. One of the homes will be a new, fully accessible rental home being partially funded through the Illinois Housing Development Authority. IHDA's support requires the rental unit to meet affordability standards. Additionally, one small activity was completed to replace an area of failed sidewalk creating a dangerous situation for the public. The target number of 15 for the Public Facility or Infrastructure activities for Low-Moderate Income Housing Benefit was originally to include the N. Catherine St. properties as well as the estimated 10 households on N. Jackson. The 7 properties on N. Catherine St. were attributed to the Low-Mod Area Benefit national objective and the one project on E. Jackson was attributed to the Rehabilitation goal. An additional 600 were added to the actual account due to the sidewalk replacement activity.

Narrative

Although the City of Bloomington's overall population is approximately 77% White and 10% Black or African American, West Bloomington's population has a higher concentration of Black/African American households and a higher concentration of low-income households so the reported numbers are a fair representation of the population served through our CDBG programs. Approximately 60% of the non-Public Service activities occurred in West Bloomington.

Racial data was collected for all activities except the Tool Library's tool loans. The City has requested both race and income data be included for all future tool loans. WBRP has added the information to their application form for new customers and will attempt to collect data for existing customers.

Note: An additional 73 families households should be added to the numbers above. However, the race categories are not available for manual entry.

A small amount of funding was returned to the Local Account at the end of the year due to unspent project funds returned to the City.

Narrative

The City did not indicate the percentage of allocation for the West Bloomington Revitalization Project Area in the Action Plan. However, more than 60% of the activities completed were within the WBRP area. Nineteen CDBG activities were completed within the WBRP service area and an additional 12 in LMA outside of the WBRP area. See the Activity Map by Wards map for an overview of project locations. The WBRP service area extends slightly beyond the designed Slum/Blight area.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

The City's Community Development staff constantly looks for ways to leverage resources in an effort to maintain/increase the current level of service despite budget cuts. The Grants Coordinator continues to pursue not only non-CDBG funding sources but also ways to create new partnerships and enhance those already in existence.

The City applied for and received funding for the Illinois Housing Development Authority's Abandoned Property Program (IHDA-APP) several years ago. The majority of the funds were leveraged to support the City's demolition program for PY40. The remaining funds the City received through this grant were expended this program year. Overall, \$52,455.06 was spent on demolition and clearance activities at six properties. Several of the properties were leveraged again when donated to Habitat for Humanity for construction of new, affordable housing.

The City is a partner member of the West Bloomington Housing Collaborative (WBHC). WBHC was formed when Mid Central Community Action (MCCA) received a \$2 million grant from the Illinois Attorney General's (AG) Office for the purpose of purchasing and rehabilitating vacant and/or foreclosed homes in West Bloomington. The City participates regularly in the WBHC and has assisted with identifying potential properties for the program. Habitat for Humanity is also a partner in the WBHC. They will build six homes total through this project. Several of the homes will be built on sites the City has demolished with CDBG funding. MCCA also received a \$100,000 grant from NeighborWorks for roof replacements in West Bloomington. MCCA is utilizing the City's waiting list to identify homes for this project. One roof was replaced during this program year. An additional 5-6 will be completed during PY42. The City will utilize CDBG to make other improvements to the properties as necessary. The WBRP Facade program is supported through \$10,000 in CDBG funding as well as a grants from PNC Bank and the AG's office.

The City administers the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) grant for the local Continuum of Care. We received funding to support six grants with fiscal years ranging from January 1 to October 1. CDBG funding was utilized to provide matching funds for two of the SHP grants. City General Fund monies are utilized for code enforcement activities, infrastructure projects and salary and benefits for staff administering the grant program.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City did not set any affordable housing goals as it does not utilize CDBG funding for new construction of affordable housing or rental assistance. The City provided infrastructure improvements on N. Catherine that allowed a local developer to build a fully accessible single-family home that will be rented at an affordable rate once completed.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

CDBG regulations do not allow the City to fund new construction directly. The City will continue to support affordable housing through the Loan Rehabilitation Program and donation of cleared lots and properties for renovation to organizations such as Habitat for Humanity and YouthBuild. The McLean County Regional Planning Commission is in the beginning phase of an intensive housing study for all of McLean County. The results of that study and completion of the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Assessment may or may not impact future annual action plans.

Narrative Information

Although the City does not utilize CDBG funds to support the construction of new affordable housing, it does provide 0% interest, deferred loans to low and moderate income households so that necessary home repairs can be made while keeping the cost of living in the home affordable. The City's demolition program also assists with the goals of creating affordable housing. Buildable lots are donated to Habitat for Humanity for new construction of affordable housing once the lots are cleared. Three of the four demolition properties for this program year were donated to Habitat for this purpose. Habitat also completed and sold two homes to low/mod households on lots previously donated by the City. The City provides rehabilitation grants to YouthBuild McLean County for rehabilitation on homes the City receives through code enforcement. The homes are then sold to low-moderate income households. One project was completed and sold to a moderate income household this project year. Rehabilitation on a second project was completed but not sold as of the end of the project year.

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

PATH (Providing Access to Help) serves as a lead coordinating agency for Central Illinois and McLean County Continuum of Care (COC). Through its Homeless Services Program, PATH reaches out to the homeless through contact with, but not limited to, hospitals, police, social service agencies, churches, and truck stops. Staff utilize their vast knowledge of local resources and crisis and intervention skills to provide direct service to families and individuals to provide both temporary and permanent shelter. The Outreach Committee of the COC makes monthly visits to tent city and other areas where the homeless congregate.

The City utilized \$23,680 in CDBG funding to support two FT positions at PATH, the Homeless Outreach Worker (HOW) and Housing and Benefits Specialist (HBS). The HBS had 207 contacts for the program year. The HBS advocates for clients needing permanent housing, provides services through the homeless day center and assists with obtaining mainstream resources such as SSI and food stamps. Families and individuals placed in permanent housing are followed for six months.

The HOW reported 430 contacts for the program year. The HOW also works closely with homeless individuals and families to ensure placement in permanent housing within 18 months of first contact. The HOW verifies homeless status and authorizes services to homeless clients through local social service agencies and shelters.

Additionally, the City provided PATH \$20,000 to support the Emergency Grant and Self-Neglect programs which provide funding for emergency shelter and homelessness prevention for those in imminent danger of becoming homeless or currently experiencing homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Emergency Shelter: The Salvation Army Safe Harbor Shelter provides shelter and services for those who are homeless. Caseworkers are available, as well as emergency residential units for women, transitional rooms for men, lunch service 3 days/week, a food pantry, and rent and utility assistance. Clients are screened by outreach workers and case managers to make sure they receive the appropriate services. The City is the lead agency for one of the COC grants providing HUD funding to Safe Harbor. Home Sweet Home Ministries, another member of the COC, provides emergency shelter, a food co-op, a mobile medical clinic and congregate meals to the homeless population as well.

The Point-in-Time Survey was completed in January 2016. Emergency shelters, transitional housing

programs, and permanent housing programs were all asked to complete surveys regarding the clients they served on one particular night. The Salvation Army and other homeless service agencies were asked to provide data on those clients living on the streets. All the COC-funded agencies participated in this one night street count. This information is used for local reporting purposes, as well as for federal HUD grant purposes.

Transitional Housing: A listing of all locally available transitional housing opportunities is included as an attachment to this report. In most instances, case management services are offered to clients residing in transitional housing. Almost all transitional housing units shown on the attached table are for families. However, the Bloomington Housing Authority and Salvation Army can take indviduals in addition to families.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City provided PATH \$20,000 to support the Emergency Grant program. This grant is utilized to provide emergency rent/mortgage and utility assistance for individuals in imminent danger of becoming homeless. It also provides payment to local hotels for individuals experiencing homelessness. Funds are paid directly to the provider and are not to exceed 3 months. A portion of the grant assists the Self-Neglect Program by assisting with the rental of dumpsters for cleanup at properties of individuals and families in imminent danger of becoming homeless due to hoarding issues and other code violations.

The City administers the Supportive Housing Program (SHP) for the local Continuum of Care. The Shelter Plus Care grant supports rental assistance for 4-5 units at Mayor's Manor, Permanent Supportive Housing, operated by Mid Central Community Action. Additionally, the SHP program supports staff positions at Salvation Army, PATH, and Recycling Furniture for Families and Collaborative Solutions. These programs help both homeless and those in imminent danger of becoming homeless.

YMCA Labyrinth provides case management and transitional housing for women entering the community from the correctional system. The City has supported Labyrinth in the past by funding a part-time case manager and assisting with rehabilitation costs for housing units. Labyrinth can house up to ten women at two transitional housing units. Seeds of Hope is an organization focused on providing the same type of service to men leaving corrections. Currently, the program provides case management only with the goal of offering transitional housing in the future.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The COC looks to rapidly house individuals and families by utilizing funds available for emergency shelter and deposit assistance. PATH, the lead coordinating agency for the COC, has FEMA funds for emergency shelter for families with children during life-threatening weather. The funds available through local Rapid ReHousing (RRH) ESG grants as well as United Way funding can be utilized to cover deposits and first month rent.

The COC has an Outreach Team works directly with intake workers at various agencies to identify individuals with the longest days of homelessness and connect them with services such as housing, case management, medical care, etc. Those with the longest length of time homeless are tracked through the HMIS as well. The City supports a FT Housing and Benefits staff member that assists with transitioning into permanent housing and facilitates follow-up services as needed.

Project Oz assists unaccompanied youth to make a transition from foster care or homelessness to permanent housing and independent living. The Bloomington Housing Authority has a prioritization policy for people experiencing homelessness. The BHA also has more flexibility with entrance requirements for people experiencing homelessness when it comes to prior evictions and landlord references. Other affordable housing complexes have an understanding of the great importance of housing people quickly and have been open to receiving referrals for homeless individuals and families. The Salvation Army has a case manager who focuses primarily on veterans.

The City of Bloomington, in conjunction with the Continuum of Care, follows several strategies for helping low income families avoid becoming homeless:

- Refer clients to PATH information and referral line to gain knowledge of services available and to access PATH Homeless Services if needed.
- Provide emergency funds to be administered through PATH to help families avoid eviction or condemnation.
- Working with the Township office which provides emergency and general assistance.
- Providing any needed information to continue receiving homeless prevention funds from the State of Illinois.
- Assisting various social service agencies offering services to this population.
- Providing emergency shelters and transitional housing resources.

• Providing Letters of Support for agencies seeking federal, state and private funding for homeless programs. The COC has four strategies to decrease the rate of individuals and families returning to homelessness. The first is to utilize the HMIS to track the episodes of homelessness. Secondly, the Continuum works to reduce the number of people returning to homelessness by supporting the individual or family while working through the barriers to housing and transitioning people to affordable housing. This is done through the Permanent Supportive Housing and the Transitional Housing opportunities available throughout the Continuum (See Appendix). Our third strategy includes a team of caseworkers working to keep those facing eviction due to unpaid rent, mortgage, or utilities from being evicted. In addition to receiving funds, clients are assessed and referred to other mainstream resources and gain access to case management, life skills development, and budgeting support. Finally, follow-up services are offered to newly housed individuals and families to support permanent housing.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

After careful study and evaluation, the Housing Authority has identified a strategy for addressing the long-term problem of high vacancy rates for efficiency units in the North Tower. In the spring of 2016 the Housing Authority reached consensus about a multi-year phased project to combine efficiency units to create larger, more functional apartments. The Housing Authority will use annual Capital Fund grants for this much needed renovation.

The Housing Authority's multi-year roof replacement project was completed in the 2015-16 program year. The final phase included roof replacement at Holton Homes. Roof replacement is a critical structural component for the 70 buildings that comprise the public housing portfolio. These new roofs will ensure that this housing remains viable for the decades to come.

In the 2015-16 program year the Housing Authority continued replacement of obsolete galvanized plumbing in Wood Hill Towers-South. Because the project requires removal of cabinets, the plumbing upgrades also provide the opportunity to renovate kitchens with new cabinets and countertops. This is a welcome upgrade for tenants and will eliminate problems with plumbing corrosion and frequent repairs.

The Housing Authority continued to benefit from energy efficiency upgrades made throughout the public housing portfolio. These upgrades continue to save water, natural gas, and electricity, which in turn saves the Housing Authority hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. The new toilets, light fixtures, boilers and other equipment installed in 2014 will benefit Housing Authority tenants for many years to come.

The City originally budgeted PY42 funding to assist with a total roof replacement at a property owned by the Housing Authority. The building was to be remodeled to accommodate the administration staff and open up several apartments in Woodhill Towers currently being utilized as office space. The Authority's board decided the overall remodel was too costly so the building will likely be sold rather than renovated. The City reallocated the funds to two separate public facility projects but will continue to work with the Authority on future projects.

Demand for affordable housing remains high. At the end of 2015, there were 75 households on the waiting list for public housing. A total of 377 application intake interviews were conducted during calendar year 2015. There are several groups/organizations looking at the issue of affordable housing in Bloomington. The McLean County Regional Planning Commission is in the early phases of an extensive housing study for all of McLean County that should pull everyone's efforts together. This study will include an analysis of public housing. The City, Bloomington Housing Authority and the Town of Normal plan to enter into a collaborative agreement which will utilize this study to complete the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Assessment collectively.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority continues to administer a Family Self Sufficiency (FSS) program for public housing residents. This voluntary program allows members of a household to save money in an escrow account when the family increases its income. This savings is paid into the account monthly as a part of the family's rent payment. Resident Services staff help the participants set self-sufficiency goals to be completed over a matter of years. The participant is allowed to tap into their escrow account for education, purchasing of a car, and even a down payment on a home. Many Housing Authority families have benefitted from this program over the years, and in 2015, three public housing residents graduated from the program and moved out of public housing after achieving significant educational and career successes.

The Housing Authority's Resident Services Department continues to offer numerous opportunities for public housing residents to improve the economic situation and enhance their quality of life. Examples include staffed on-site computer labs, an after-school tutoring program, a gardening program, and an annual Health Fair, in which more than 60 public housing residents participated this past year.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The Bloomington Housing Authority is not categorized as troubled.

CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The City makes a concerted effort to keep all building permits/fees as low as possible. All approved contractors completing CDBG activities and not-for-profit agencies conducting housing activities are provided fee waivers. Currently, the City is reviewing its zoning ordinances and will take affordable housing into consideration when making any changes. The City also provides letters of support for a local developers seeking tax credits for affordable housing development. The City provided one letter to a developer building an affordable housing complex for seniors.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City provided CDBG-funded rehabilitation loans to single-family, owner-occupied, income-eligible households. Twenty-one households were assisted in the form of grants or deferred loans from CDBG funds in 2015-2016 in the amount of \$237,402.28. These grants corrected many code violations and allowed the families to remain in their home while keeping the cost for necessary improvements at a minimum. The City also utilized \$118,629.54 in CDBG funds and leveraged IDHA funds to demolish and clear deteriorated structures in an effort to eliminate slum and blight. A total of four demolitions were completed with CDBG funding and IHDA Abandoned Property Program funds in 2015-2016. (See PR-02) Many of these lots were/will be deeded to YouthBuild McLean County or Habitat for Humanity for construction of affordable homes.

Two YouthBuild of McLean County activities carried over from PY40. YouthBuild completed the rehab on one of the homes which was sold to a moderate income household. Rehab on the 2nd project was wrapping up at the end of PY41. YouthBuild will utilize a local realtor to market the property in addition to offering homeowner prep classes with the goal of selling the property within 6 months of completion.

Community Development continues to partner with our local AMBUCS chapter. AMBUCS provides labor for accessible ramp construction and Community Development uses CDBG funding to purchase the materials. Two ramps were completed during PY41.

Staff participated in several working groups dedicated to affordable housing in the community. In 2014, the League of Women voters formed a Housing Study Work Group that looked at housing opportunities currently available in the community and began identifying gaps in housing needs. The League provided a Consensus Statement in late 2015 that identified lack of affordable housing and Permanent Supportive Housing as issues within our community. The Study Group has shifted gears and is now considered an Action Group. City staff will continue to participate. Additionally, staff served on the Tiny Homes Study

Group which looked at the feasibility of a tiny home community in the City to meet the needs of the chronically homeless. The McLean County Regional Planning Commission is currently selecting a contractor to conduct a 9-month in depth housing study for McLean County. The City will provide PY42 funding to help fund the study. The results will be utilized to direct future CDBG housing projects and aid in the completion of the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Assessment.

The City is the administrator for the McLean County Continuum of Care Supportive Housing Program (SHP) grant. Through this funding opportunity, the City partnered with PATH to administer six grants which provided supportive services and/or rental assistance to six agencies working to meet the needs of the homeless. These grants provided case management, counseling, moving assistance, rent subsidies, transportation (bus tokens), and basic health service coverage for homeless individuals and families.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City has on staff a licensed Lead Risk Assessor, Lead Inspector and Lead Supervisor (one person holds all certifications). In addition, the City of Bloomington requires their eligible participating contractors to be certified in the EPA's Lead Renovation, Repair and Painting Rule (RRP) curriculum. The City provides the training every five years at no expense to all CDBG approved contractors. The most recent training was held April 2015 with 20 contractors in attendance.

The City retains the services of a third party to handle the Risk Assessment and Inspection. The City's inhouse licensed Lead Risk Assessor/Inspector/Supervisor assisted said third party in the Lead Supervisor duties. The third party and city staff completed all necessary inspections, reporting and clearance testing. All inspections, reporting and clearance follow HUD's required lead-based paint procedures per 24 CFR Part 35.

In addition, the City of Bloomington, through its Code Enforcement Division, maintains a Rental Registration and Inspection program for all units that turn over tenancy. Landlords are asked to bring structures to code for the tenants. Landlords are required to follow state and local construction protocols for all repairs. If repairs are not made, code violations are cited. Lead paint is included in the inspection process.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Bloomington concentrated on the primary strategy for reducing poverty in the community by focusing on stabilizing owner-occupied homes with an emphasis on the West Bloomington area. Nineteen of the 31 CDBG projects completed in PY41 were conducted in the West Bloomington Revitalization Project area. Bloomington also continued partnerships to produce new and rehabilitated housing with Mid Central Community Action, local lenders, Habitat for Humanity and YouthBuild. Additionally, the City is participating in both the United Way's Cradle to Career Collective

Impact process and the local 60x25 inititative. Both groups are focusing on reducing poverty through improved high school graduation rates and post-secondary degree/credential attainment.

The City dedicated \$10,000 in CDBG funding to support the Section 3 training program for Bloomington Housing Authority residents. BHA utilized the funding to provide three different opportunities this year. They contracted with the Family Community Resource Center's Career and Self-Sufficiency Training Program (CASS) to provide two week-long training programs for public housing residents and Section 8 participants. Topics included self-awareness, job readiness, obtaining/maintaining a job, budgeting, finance and healthy living and social media. This format was highly successful and resulted in nearly twice the program participants as in years past. BHA also provided a job fair for its residents and Section 8 participants. This was also successful with 50 residents attending. Currently, these programs have resulted in four job placements for residents.

One of the City's most valuable partners is Mid Central Community Action (MCCA). MCCA has a variety of programs and services aimed to help reduce the number of poverty-level families in McLean and Livingston County. Below is a listing of some of MCCA's accomplishments for PY41. Homeownership PromotionWith assistance from MCCAâ¿Â¿s HUD-Certified Housing Counselors, 32 households in the City of Bloomington successfully completed the homebuyer education curriculum. Housing and Financial Coaching 41 households were active in rental counseling, 20 of which were new cases in the reporting period. 11 households were active in home purchase counseling, 10 of which were new cases in the reporting period. 62 households were active in homeownership (post-purchase) counseling, 18 of which were new cases in the reporting period. 17 households were active in foreclosure intervention/mortgage default counseling, 14 of which were new cases in the reporting period. *Note that some of these households are also involved in the Next Step program (data below).

Community EducationIn October 2014, MCCA began hosting monthly Money Matters workshops, in coordination with Heartland Bank, to provide educational information about personal budgeting, basic banking, credit building, and credit repair. Between October 2015 and April 30, 2016, 12 monthly Money Matters workshops were conducted, providing education for 138 individuals, including 98 Bloomington residents. In February 2016, MCCA began hosting an educational workshop series, including four workshops per series, for individuals and families interested in homeownership. These workshops throughout 2016. The four workshops cover information about basic things to consider when thinking about homeownership, working with a realtor, the importance of a home inspection, and how to get involved in your new neighborhood. Mid Central Community Action also started incorporating a financial education workshop for individuals and families who wanted to participate in our ongoing financial coaching program (Next Step) as well as those interested in (non-LIHEAP) income support services. Through this group education, called the Practical Money Skills Orientation, more than 388 individuals completed the workshop, including 209 Bloomington residents, during the reporting period (5/1/2015-4/30/2016). Next StepThe Next Step collaborative began in September 2013 and includes a partnership between Mid Central Community Action, Heartland Community College, United Way of McLean County, and the U of I College of Law Community Preservation Clinic. As this collaborative project continues, MCCA encourages all of its clients to participate in the financial coaching program to

help them achieve their financial, educational, and employment goals. Through this program, a number of individuals and families have increased their credit score, increased their savings, reduced debt, obtained or improved their employment, and have worked toward obtaining a degree from a higher education institution. Community Building & Engagement MCCA hosted NeighborWorks Week (June 2015) the theme was Celebrating Community. Activities for the week included a neighborhood landscape project where residents collectively chose a signature piece for the neighborhood and over 40 residents created a layering flowerpot for their front yards. Addition activities included: gardens at Mayors Manor, Tree Dedications for previous board members and leaders, planting flowers with the Boys & Girls Club and a neighborhood block party to wrap up the week. MCCA participated in the third Annual Westside 5K Run/Walk and Global Youth Service Day at the Bloomington/Normal Boys & Girls Club. MCCA provided an interactive financial literacy duck pond for children and adults. Additionally, it provided information about our Countering Domestic Violence Program and coloring activities for children. MCCA's Community Building & Engagement Coordinator helped support local resident voices regarding changes to the Bloomington bus route that would eliminate a stop outside of the MCCA and a large section on West Washington Street in West Bloomington. The coordinator worked with local nonprofit agencies, businesses and residents to circulate a petition and attended meetings regarding proposed changes to speak on behalf of our agency and neighborhood. The change in routes would have greatly limited transportation options for those receiving service through MCCA's programs as well as reduced the availability of bus service to and from jobs outside of West Bloomington.

Money Smart Week

CDBG funds were contributed towards marketing for the 8th annual Money Smart Week. Money Smart Week offered a variety of financial educational sessions throughout the week at several different venues/times. Topics covered in April 2016 were related to retirement planning, understanding and improving credit scores, investing, identify theft, home ownership and cutting expenses around the house.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City is currently involved in two collective impact groups designed to make improvements to instructional structure. The United Way McLean County (UWMC) serves as the backbone organization for the Cradle to Career Collective Impact Steering Committee which is focused on improving the health and wellfare of all children in McLean County. The process started with a focus solely on graduation rates within McLean County but it quickly became apparent that graduation rates are only one aspect of a much larger issue. For the past year, the committee has been looking at data related to all aspects of education and child development that may affect a student's liklihood of graduating from high school with a strong emphasis on collecting disparity data for low income and minority students. The committee has also looked at job development and career readiness issues for post-graduation. After a year of data collection, the committee is set to begin compiling the information and creating strategic goals. This process will continue through the next program year with the ultimate goal of changing the institutional structure within McLean County to increase the likelihood of success for all children.

The City is also involved in the local 60x25 initative. 60x25 is a national movement to reach the goal of 60% of adults having post-secondary degrees or credentialing by 2025. Although this is a separate initiative, it fits within the Cradle to Career project quite nicely. McLean County joined the Illinois 60x25 Network in January 2016. Five team members, including the Community Development Grants Coordiantor, attended the Network's annual meeting in Springfield at the end of January. The meeting provided the opportunity to meet with other communities currently involved in the initiative and gain a better understanding of the opportunities available for programs and funding. Additional training will be available in late July.

Several years ago City staff met with local service providers to discuss community needs and services provided by each agency to meet those needs. Many collaborative efforts have resulted from this meeting as those involved realized that many agencies were providing the same services. With the reduction of duplicated services, agencies are able to better focus on spending limited resources where they best meet the unmet needs of our residents.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Bloomington City Council adopted a new Comprehensive Plan in August 2015. City staff participated in the Housing Work Group for the Plan. This group looked at housing data and established goals and objectives for the Plan which covers the next several decates. Other members of the Housing Work Group included social service agencies such as MCCA and LIFECIL, local realtors and Habitat for Humanity.

The McLean County Regional Planning Commission is currently in the contractor selection phase of an extensive housing study that will look intensely at the housing issues within the county. The Executive Committee overseeing the study consists of staff from BHA, MCCA and the City in addition to others. This study will not only identify our strengths and weaknesses in providing appropriate housing opportunities but also strategies to close gaps where needed. Study results will be utilized to complete the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Assessment.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

In 2013, the City of Bloomington contracted with the United Way of McLean County to update the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Report. The purpose of the report, completed in the spring of 2014, is to provide a thorough and objective review of the current housing market in the community. The report aims to identify any barriers which prevent or hinder a fair housing market in the community. Lastly, the report identifies steps the City of Bloomington is currently taking to eliminate, reduce and prevent such impediments.

The information below outlines the impediments and how the City is addressing the issues:

- 1) Increased cost of residential development due to increased fees, building material and labor; low-income individuals have fewer affordable homes available:
 - The City attempts to maintain an equitable, fair list of development fees. The City will continue to monitor these fees and attempt to identify the balance between affordability and accessible City services and amenities. Additionally, the City offers permit waivers for not-for-profit organizations and all approved contractors working on CDBG projects.
 - The City partners with several not-for-profit organizations dedicated to providing affordable
 housing through new construction and rehabilitation. Through these partnerships, low and
 moderate income households are able to purchase affordable housing that would not have been
 otherwise available.
- 2) Public Transportation: Limited bus routes and inconvenient hours of operation:
 - Connect Transit has spent the past several months proposing new routes and days of service for Bloomington residents. Previously buses did not run on Sundays which greatly limited job opportunitites for residents in certain portions of the City. Connect Transit will be adding limited bus service on Sundays in July 2016 which will greatly improve the mobility of the City's lower income residents.
- 3) Infrastructure: Deteriorating roads and sidewalks:
 - The City typically budgets a portion of the annual CDBG allocation for infrastructure projects in low and moderate income areas.
 - A good portion of the PY41 budget was dedicated to an infrastructure project on N. Catherine
 St. which provided new
- 4) Accessibility for disabled persons; need for more Permanent Supportive Housing:
 - As the administrator for several COC grants, the City supports rent subsidy for several units at Mayor's Manor, one of the two HUD-funded Permanent Supportive Housing programs in McLean County.
 - The infrastructure project on N. Catherine lead to the construction of a new, fully accessible rental home. The City continues to partner with AMBUCS to provide accessibility ramps for low and moderate income homeowners.
 - The City also provided gap funding for a metal ramp at a rental property. A low income family living on the property was going to be faced with either moving or separating the family unit due to their inability to access the building with their disabled adolescent. The child had become too large to carry so an access ramp was desperately needed. The ramp is mobile and

- can move with the family should the need arise.
- The City participates on the League of Women Voter's Housing Work Group which is currently looking at housing needs. Permanent Supportive Housing has been identified as a need within that group.
- The City will provide CDBG assistance to the McLean County Regional Planning Commission's
 upcoming extensive housing study. A requirement of the consultant agreement will be to
 provide action items to address local needs, which should include Permanent Supportive
 Housing. The housing study will also be utilized when completing the Affirmatively Furthering
 Fair Housing Assessment.
- 5) Lending practices; many payday lender and consumer installment loan licenses in Bloomington:
 - In 2011, the City passed a resolution to prohibit particularly dangerous types of payday and consumer loans.
- 6) Public perception of affordable housing; expensive rental units:
 - The City partners with Habitat for Humanity, YouthBuild and other non-profits for new construction of affordable housing and rehabilitation of existing homes in our low and moderate income areas.

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The City underwent a CDBG Program Year 41 HUD monitor on HUD May 1 - 4, 2016. HUD also reviewed the Families and Individuals with Disabilities Supportive Housing Program grant that ran May 1, 2015-April 30, 2016. The City anticipates a formal finding for both grants on the lack of adequate policies and procedures outlining both the CDBG and COC program administration. All policies and procedures will be updated after the formal monitoring letter is received so that all issues can be adequately addressed.

The City of Bloomington's current monitoring plan is based on the standards and procedures included in the CDBG Monitoring Handbook published by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Monitoring activities included:

- Creating and implementing a tracking system to track progress of all projects;
- Preparing periodic reports and an annual report covering all activities;
- Periodically monitoring sub-recipients, including reviewing the required annual financial audit, conducting site visits and/or desk audits and consulting on a regular basis;
- Securing an annual audit by an outside CPA firm for compliance with generally accepted practices and principals of accounting and compliance with federal statutes and regulations.

If and when Community Development has sub-recipients, each is monitored on an annual basis. Records of the review are kept in the sub-recipient's activity file. During FY41, we had five sub-recipients that received funds for public services. All sub-recipients were monitored on-site at least once. Each sub-recipient received a follow-up letter identifying any issues or concerns discovered during the monitoring. No major violations were found. The sub-recipients were as follows:

- 1. PATH: Received match money from CDBG for the Continuum of Care program. Funds were used to assist with the salaries of two positions the Homeless Outreach Worker and the Housing and Benefits Specialist. In addition, PATH received funding for and administered our Emergency Grant Fund program.
- 2. Peace Meal: Provided congregate and in-home meals for seniors in Bloomington.
- 3. BHA: Provided professional development/job readiness training for public housing residents.
- 4. WBRP: Administered the Tool Library and Facade programs.
- 5. Construction Charities: Received funding to administer (1) manufactured housing project.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City's Citizen Participation Plan requires the CAPER be available for public review no less than 15 days. The PY41 CAPER was available for public comment beginning July 8th with the comment period ending on July 28th following a public hearing on the same day. A formal notice of availability was published in the Pantagraph, the main local print media, on July 7th. The notice also appeared in the PATH-O-Gram twice during the public comment period. The PATH-O-Gram is an electronic resource newsletter that goes to more than 1000 service providers, residents and businesses twice a month. Notice of Availability was mailed to approximately 25 social service agencies and churches in the area and at the various public housing offices. Additionally, the notice was available for viewing on the City's website, City Hall, Bloomington Public Library and at the main office of the Bloomington Housing Authority.

This project will result in 6 replacement activities for the Woodbury Subdivision (Activity 609). Activity 609 was funded in 2004 using \$341,950.83 in Entitlement Funds and 12,403.17 in Program Income for a total of \$354,354. In 2015, HUD determined that all but \$125,000 failed to meet a National Objective and the balance needed to be returned. Per HUD's instructions, 5 new housing activities will be set up at \$25,000 each and the remaining balance will be attributed to a new, previously unfunded activity. The addresses for the 5 properties are: 15 Richwood Trail, 17 Richwood Trail, 1210 Woodbury Place, 1110 Woodbury Place and 1108 Woodbury Place. The remaining balance of \$229,354 will be utilized on a new sewer lining project in the City's low and moderate income area. These funds will be added to the City's local account in IDIS from the City's General Fund.

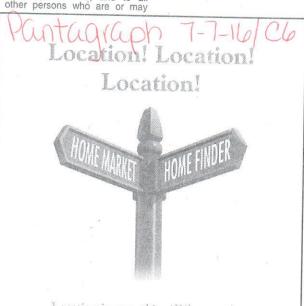
